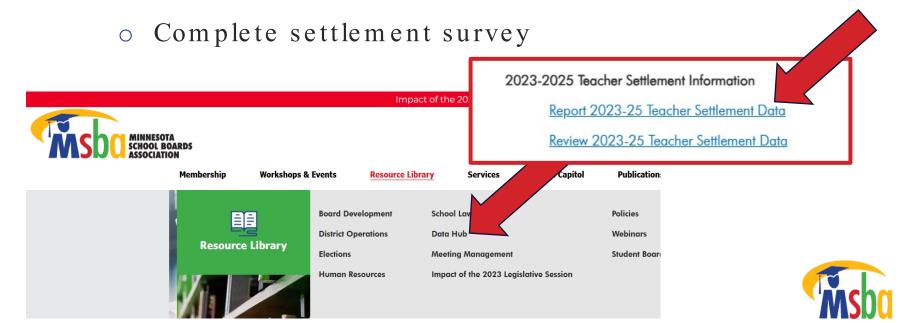

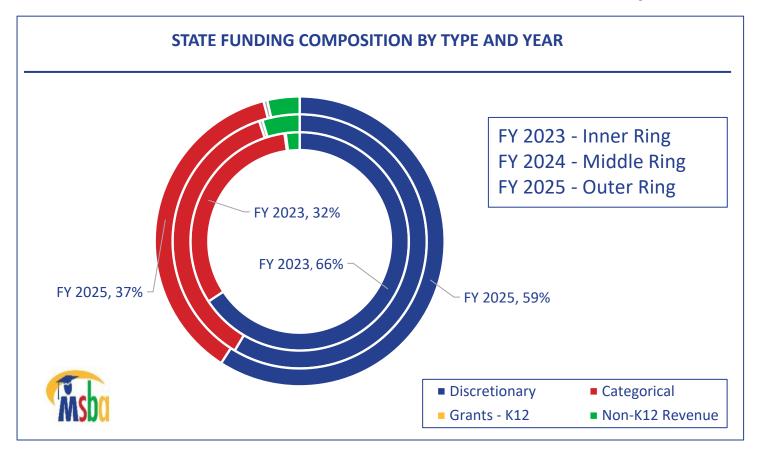

# Legislative: 2023 Data

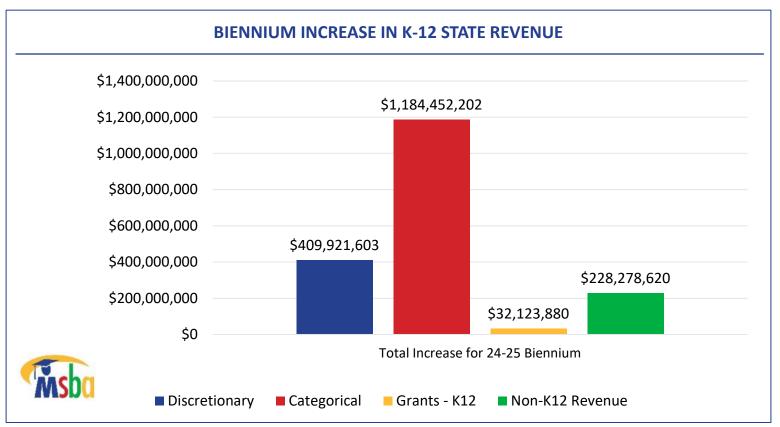
## 2023 K-12 State Revenue Analysis

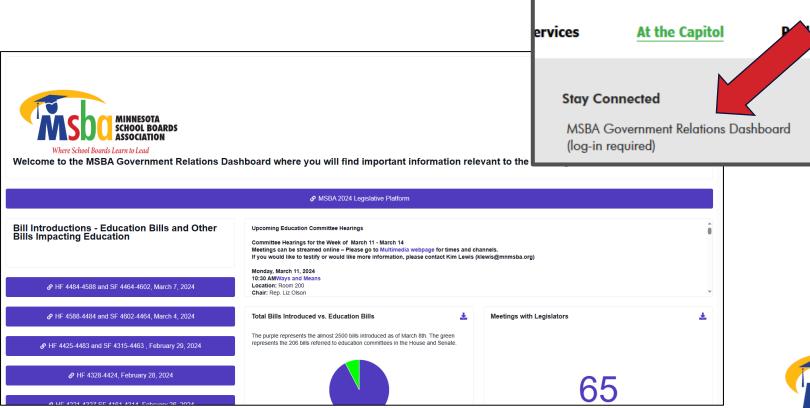
## 2023 K-12 State Revenue Analysis

## Probationary Period

Initial probationary period?

Subd. 5. Probationary period. (a) The first three consecutive years of a teacher's first teaching experience in Minnesota in a single district are deemed to be a probationary period of employment.....

\*(f) Notwithstanding any law to the contrary, a teacher who has taught for three consecutive years in a single school district or <u>single charter school in Minnesota or another state</u> must serve a probationary period of no longer than one year in a Minnesota school district.

- Subsequent probationary period?

  ...and, the probationary period in each district in which the teacher is thereafter employed shall be one year.

## Probationary Period / ULA

## NEW this year!

- Prior experience in...
  - a charter school
  - o an out-of-state school
- ECFE/ ABE (placement and seniority)
  - Now eligible for continuing contract status.
  - o Don't forget to do evaluations!
- "Teaching days" reduced from 120 to 90 days

## Earned sick and safe time (ESST)

- e-Learning days
  - o e-Learning days are paid under MS 120A.414, Subd. 6

#### Subd. 6. Other school personnel.

A school district or charter school that declares an e-learning day must continue to pay the full wages for scheduled work hours and benefits of all school employees for the duration of the e-learning period. During the e-learning period, school employees must be allowed to work from home to the extent practicable, be assigned to work in an alternative location, or be retained on an on-call basis for any potential need.

o Can employees use ESST?

MS 181.9447, Subd. 1(4) allows employees to use ESST for:

- (4) closure of the employee's place of business due to weather or other public emergency or an employee's need to care for a family member whose school or place of care has been closed due to weather or other public emergency;

## Options for teachers

- TRA Part-Time Teaching Program
  - Part-time teaching program : Teachers Retirement Association
     (TRA) (minnesotatra.org)

#### **Example**

- Teacher A is a 1.0 FTE in 2023-2024 at a salary of \$70,000.
- The school district and Teacher A agree to a 0.50 FTE for 2024-2025.
- Teacher A and the district contribute to TRA based on the \$35,000 0.50 salary.

#### Option 1:

Teacher A contributes the TRA employee and employer contributions on the unearned amount of \$35,000.

#### **Option 2:**

Teacher A contributes the TRA employee portion on the \$35,000; the school district contributes the employer portion (or some portion of it).



## Donations

- Can school boards accept donations?
  - o Yes! MS 123B.02, Subd. 6
- Must the school board approve all donations?
  - O Yes! Donations must be approved by resolution adopted by a two-thirds majority of the school board. MS 465.03
- Consent agenda?
- Designation?
- Receipts?
- Can a school board member ---- donate their time?



## Insurance Renewals

- Expect...
  - o Premium increases
  - o Deductible increases
  - o Roof coverage terms and conditions changes
  - O Workers' compensation experience "mod" changes
- Prepare...
  - Review workers' compensation claims for patterns
  - Review list of facilities projects to be sure agent knows of any changes
